Curriculum: Overview



- All students take up the study of a language: French or Spanish.
- Students also study the humanities as the separate subjects of Geography, History and RE.
- Students study Citizenship with PSHE (Personal, Social, Health education)
- A small number of delicate learners study a combined curriculum with fewer teachers until they are ready to join mainstream classes.

- Students will be given logins for these websites, and have the opportunity to attend homework club after school for internet access.

- Students will continue to improve their reading levels whilst they are at SPWT
- Students must carry a reading book with them at all times
- Books can be borrowed from the library
- Students are expected to read every day for 20 minutes, both at home and at school
- Please check that your son or daughter is reading regularly and that what they are reading is appropriate for their reading age.




This is the programme used during tutor-time

Tutors read three times per week to students and students follow along with a copy of the book


This is a reading programme designed to increase a love of reading











Curriculum: Reading assessments



- Students will be assessed to ascertain their reading age at the start of Year 7
- Students with a below expected reading age will receive literacy intervention to help them to make rapid progress
- We recommend students read for 20 minutes per day in order to support their literacy and maintain it over the summer holidays. This will have a huge impact on how well they do across **all** their subjects.





- The library is open from 8:30-16:30 Monday to Friday. Students can visit the library before school, during break and lunchtimes, and afterschool.
- There are over 9,800 books in the library plus a range of eBooks and Audiobooks available online for students to access from home.

- The library hosts a variety of events and competitions throughout the school year including Harry Potter days, author visits, school trips, and celebrations for World Book Day.



Curriculum: Assessment



- Students are regularly assessed in every lesson through a variety of teaching strategies and given verbal feedback on how to improve.
- For each subject, students complete a formative task once or twice a half term, depending on how often the subject is taught.
- Following this, books are taken in by the teacher and a feedback lesson is planned to help students improve in the subject.
- Students sit a larger assessment twice a year (mid year and end of year). These assessments are marked, analysed and reports are sent home.
- The mid year reports will be used as a point of discussion at a parents' evening.






"Norms must be 100% otherwise the norm becomes a "maybe".

Support and Intervention





Our process of universal support:

- Classroom Principles
- Whole group Positive Support
- Individual Anonymous Support
- First Reminder

This means that we support students and have created rigorous checks and balances that ensure reminders are applied consistently and fairly.

Support for wider wellbeing needs:

- School counsellor: students referred by staff and can selfrefer
- Learning Support staffed by specialist teacher and LSAs with personalised programmes for individual students
- Tennis and Basketball mentoring to support mental health and wellbeing
- Safeguarding Team with school based social worker support
- Staff trained in Mental Health First Aid
- Wellbeing support work with THEWS.

Additional Educational Needs:

Pupil passports inform staff of needs and strategies to support AEN students

- Golden Group Curriculum to support the most vulnerable AEN students
- Combined curriculum at KS4 focus on core subjects and interventions
- Programme of interventions: SALT, Literacy, Social Groups
- AEN hub area for students at unstructured times
- External agency support




